
2023-2024 Highlights







WHAT is the program?	 ASPIRE provides: Culturally Responsive Support: Offers services that honor AANHPI students' diverse cultural identities and enrich their educational journey. Key Programs: Provides academic counseling, Tea Talk Tuesdays, workshops, and campus field trips to support student engagement. Community and Retention: Focuses on building community and promoting retention through essential student services.
WHO does it serve?	Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander (AANHPI) student community but is open to ALL students.
HOW can I get involved?	If interested, please contact Sabrina Nguyen: tmguyen3839@cccd.edu with your ideas and/or willingness to help with events.





College Autism Program (CAP)/The Loop

WHAT is the program?	College Autism Program/The Loop offers personalized services for academic and personal success. Students receive academic, social-emotional, career, and transfer counseling. Services include academic coaching, case management, workshops, and peer mentoring. The LOOP, a student group within CAP, fosters peer connections. LOOP members meet weekly with an advisor to discuss college-related topics.	
WHO does it serve?	Over 180 autistic students or students who identify as being autistic & are registered at DSPS. We have 52 incoming freshmen registered in CAP for Fall 2024!	
HOW can I get involved?	It is our 10-year anniversary! We have been able to grow & become successful because of all the support of our GWC faculty & staff! We welcome all allies to volunteer at our Loop group on Fridays 10-11:30am. Come share your expertise, your experiences with autism, college life, skills, or just ask questions. Dream Success



WHAT is the program?	Dream Success supports students with the California Dream Act application and allows eligible students enrolled in California Colleges, Universities, and Career Education Programs to apply for state and institutional financial aid. The California Dream Act (CDA) application is overseen by the California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) and should be completed by students who may be eligible for California state aid programs only under the AB540 status.
WHO does it serve?	Dream Success serves undocumented students and allies. We support undocumented students—those without legal documentation, including

individuals with or without DACA and those legalizing their status—and committed allies.

HOW can I get involved?

Support and engage with events by helping promote events or referring students to us for resources.

Dual Enrollment



WHAT is the program?	Dual Enrollment Overview: High school students take college classes and earn credit for both high school and college. Types of Dual Enrollment: 1) Regular college courses (concurrent enrollment) and 2) CCAP courses designed specifically for high school students. Program Pathways: Includes pathways like Early College Academy (associate degree) and focused tracks in Nursing, Automotive, Criminal Justice, Drafting, Psychology, Math, and English.	
WHO does it serve?	school students in grades 9 through 12. Students from any district can self-select to participate CCAP dual enrollment is currently organized in Garden Grove Unified School District (GGUSD) Huntington Beach Union High School District (HBUHSD).	
HOW can I get involved?	Contact Dr. Lauren Sosenko, Dean of Dual Enrollment and Institutional Effectiveness, ldavissosenko@cccd.edu. Faculty may also talk to their discipline Dean about opportunities to teach dual enrollment.	

Disabled Students Programs & Services (DSPS)

WHAT is the program?	Disabled Students Programs and Services (DSPS) provides support for students with disabilities to ensure equitable access to college education and experiences.	
WHO does it serve?	Students with disabilities that impact their ability to fully participate in college: Physical Disabilities: Mobility, visual, or hearing impairments. Learning Disabilities: Dyslexia, ADHD, processing disorders. Psychological Disabilities: Anxiety, depression, bipolar disorder. Developmental Disabilities: Intellectual disabilities, autism spectrum disorders. Brain Injuries: Traumatic brain injuries, strokes. Health Impairments: Chronic illnesses, allergies, diabetes.	
HOW can I get involved?	 Faculty can identify students who may benefit from DSPS support. They can also maintain an inclusive and welcoming classroom environment to encourage students to share challenges, engage in private conversations with students facing difficulties, offering support and suggesting DSPS resources, and refer students to DSPS for accommodations and assistance to help them succeed academically and personally. 	



Extended Opportunity Programs & Services (EOPS)

WHAT	is	the

EOPS, Extended Opportunity Programs and Services, supports first-generation students facing economic, language, social, and educational challenges.

CARE: Assistance for single parents receiving public aid.

NEXT UP/Guardian Scholars: Support for current and former foster youth in achieving academic and personal goals.

WHO does it serve?

First generation college students who face economic, language, and social and/or educational barriers.

HOW can I get involved?

If GWC employees encounter students who may qualify for our programs—such as first-generation college students, single parents, or former foster youth—we encourage and welcome referrals to EOPS. The goals of the Title V/STEM Grant are to:

- Expand educational opportunities and improve academic attainment, especially for Hispanic students.
- Enhance academic offerings, program quality, and institutional stability.
- Increase Hispanic student representation in STEM to match the college's overall Hispanic population.
- Improve Hispanic students' success rates in STEM courses.
- Boost Hispanic students' transfer rates to four-year institutions in STEM.
- Provide professional development for STEM faculty to enhance Hispanic students' success.
- Increase Hispanic students' participation in financial literacy workshops.

WHO does it serve?

The program serves STEM students: particularly, Hispanic STEM students.

HOW can I get involved?

- GWC STEM faculty can participate through professional development, conferences, and collaboration with embedded tutors to support Hispanic STEM students.
